Artist Reflection

Four Waters At Table

This summer my family traveled back to Okinawa and mainland Japan, the places we lived during my infant and toddler years. Those years molded the family lore and marked a pivotal shift in my parents' lives. They traveled with us this summer, returning after 40 years. As you might imagine, I was amazed by everything. I was particularly taken by the great deference that the human-made physical structures held for creation. The waters have power and everything reflects that awareness. Vegetation is grown and walls are built between the houses and the water. We stayed by the water for 4 days while local children were still in school. Even on the weekend, though, we were some of the only ones swimming in the East China Sea by our AirBnB.

This artwork reflects that deference – the humility in the face of the power of the waters – through an adaptation of the Okinawa wave pattern that is found on pottery throughout the island. Here, each wave represents a disciple around a circular table. Judas's wave flows the opposite direction from all of the others, creating discord in the pattern and in the narrative. He seeks a worldly type of power. Within the table, four rivers flow out from Jesus, who is represented as a 13th wave flowing in the midst. These rivers represent the four rivers of Eden, the four spirits in Revelation, and the multitude of followers across time and place. Patterns tell the story of this last table: money seeding discord, wine and bread becoming symbols of the faith, bread breaking, hands reaching toward one another in right relationship. The Jesus symbol of water in the midst flows through each of these sections and breaks the borders of the artwork. How might I walk forward from this table with Jesus? Tacking toward humble strength in the face of oppressive power? Nurturing community? Breaking the barriers of oppressive influences?

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Please pick up a rock as you enter.

Opening Liturgy

People: Christ, have mercy.

Celebrant: Christ who died for us all, grant us your salvation.

People: Lord, have mercy.

Celebrant: Christ crucified, done to death and buried, give us

hope.

People: Lord, have mercy.

Celebrant: Christ who descended into hell, raise us to glory.

People: Lord, have mercy.

Celebrant: Bless the Lord who forgives all our sins;

People: God's mercy endures for ever.

Celebrant: Since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of

witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the

sin that clings so closely, and let us run with

perseverance the race that is set before us, looking

to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who

for the sake of the joy that was set before him

endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has

taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

Confession

All: We confess our sins to you, Father, Son, and Spirit Holy.

Compassionate God of life, your kindly pardon give: for our careless talk, our broken oath, our empty speech; for all that we have left undone, for all that we have done amiss. Jesus, only-begotten Son and Lamb of God the Father, you gave the blood of your body to save us from the grave.

As we receive the Word and knowledge of your forgiveness, enshield us, encircle us, each day, each night, each dark, each light. Bring us back to that place where our journey began, when we said that we would follow the way that you first trod. Uphold us, be our treasure, our triumph everlasting, strong Son of God most high. Lead us to the Cross and meet us there. AMEN.

We cannot carry the weight of sin and expect to be present to God, ourselves or others in any significant way. At his crucifixion, Jesus broke the powers of sin and death. You are invited to lay your burden, symbolized by the rock that you picked up, before the cross of Christ.

The Absolution


Celebrant:

The Collect of the Day

Gospel Reading: John 13:21-32

Deacon: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to

John.

All: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

At supper with his friends, Jesus was troubled in spirit, and declared, "Very truly, I tell you, one of you will betray me." The disciples looked at one another, uncertain of whom he was speaking. One of his disciples – the one whom Jesus loved – was reclining next to him; Simon Peter therefore motioned to him to ask Jesus of whom he was speaking. So while reclining next to Jesus, he asked him, "Lord, who is it?" Jesus answered, "It is the one to whom I give this piece of bread when I have dipped it in the dish." So when he had dipped the piece of bread, he gave it to Judas son of Simon Iscariot. After he received the piece of bread, Satan entered into him. Jesus said to him, "Do quickly what you are going to do." Now no one at the table knew why he said this to him. Some thought that, because Judas had the common purse, Jesus was telling him, "Buy what we need for the festival"; or, that he should give something to the poor. So, after receiving the piece of bread, he immediately went out. And it was night.

When he had gone out, Jesus said, "Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once."

THE HOLY COMMUNION

A note about receiving Holy Communion: In the Episcopal Church, we understand that Christ is "really present" in the bread and wine provided from God's table. All who claim Christ as Lord are always welcome to receive the sacrament of Holy Communion in this church. Children are welcome to receive communion at the discretion of their parents.

Come forward at the direction of the ushers. Receive the consecrated wafer in the palm of your outstretched hand from the first person who comes to you. To receive a gluten-free wafer, please cross your hands palms down. You may drink from the chalice which the next person will offer you. Receive the consecrated wine by guiding the offered cup to your lips and sipping, or by intinction: lightly dip the wafer into the wine. Those who distribute the wine will wipe the chalice with a food safe sanitizer and turn it for the next person after each person receives. You may also decide to take the wafer only. If you choose not to receive communion, you may cross your arms over your chest and receive a blessing as your presence is a blessing to all of us. Once you have been blessed or received communion, you may offer a short prayer and then return to your seat.

If physical limitations make it difficult to come forward, please let an usher know that we may have the honor of bringing communion to you.

Eucharistic Prayer

Celebrant: All things are yours, O God of all creation,

People: And so we return our gifts to you.

Celebrant: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Celebrant: Lift up your hearts.

People: We lift them to the Lord.

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People: It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Celebrant: Worship and praise belong to you, maker of light

and darkness. Your wisdom draws beauty from

chaos, brings a harvest out of sorrow and leads the

exiles home. In Christ your Son's enemies are

reconciled, debts forgiven and strangers made

welcome. Your Spirit frees us to live as sons and

daughters in our Father's house. We who by

Christ's power follow the way of the Cross, sharing

the joy of his obedience, now offer you our praise,

with angels and archangels and the whole company

of heaven saying the hymn of your unending

glory:

All:

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord, God of power and might.

Heaven and earth are full of your glory, Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

Hosanna in the highest.

The Celebrant continues

Glory and thanksgiving be to you, most loving Father, for Christ in whom the world is reconciled. Lifted on the Cross, his suffering and forgiveness spanned the gulf our sins had made. Through that dark struggle death was swallowed up in victory, that life and light might reign. Before he was given up to suffering and death, recalling the night of Israel's release, the night in which the sons of Egypt died, your Chosen One, himself the First-Born, freely offered his life. At supper with his disciples he took bread and offered you thanks. He broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying: "Take, eat. This is my Body: it is broken for you." After supper, he took the cup, he offered you thanks, and gave it to them saying: "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new covenant; it is poured out for you, and for all, that sins may be forgiven. Do this in remembrance of me."

We now obey your Son's command. We recall his blessed passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension; and we look for the coming of his Kingdom. Made one with him, we offer you these gifts and with them ourselves, a single, holy, living sacrifice. Hear us, most merciful Father, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, overshadowed by his life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your Kingdom. Help us, who are baptized into the fellowship of Christ's Body to live and work to your praise and glory; may we grow together in unity and love until at last, in your new creation, we enter into our heritage in the company of Mary the Mother of God, the apostles, and prophets, and of all our brothers and sisters living and departed.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end. **AMEN**.

The Lord's Prayer

Celebrant: As our Savior Christ has taught us, we now pray.

All: Our Father, in heaven, hallowed be your

Name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial, and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and for ever. Amen.

Celebrant: He who has suffered for our injustices is now

present in this bread.

He whose body was hung on a cross is now offered

to us in this cup.

Fraction

Celebrant: The living bread is broken for the life of the world.

People: Lord, unite us in this sign.


Celebrant: Come, you holy ones, receive the body and blood
